In 2017, Death Valley National Park hosted approximately 1.2 million visitors.

Lighting

Death Valley National Park continues to maintain compliance with the lighting management plan. Our park neighbors in Death Valley, including Furnace Creek Resorts and the Timbisha Tribe, recognize the value of the night sky and have modified their lighting. The Furnace Creek Resorts are undergoing extensive renovations, including a name change to The Oasis at Death Valley. Project managers have assured us that they share our goal of preserving Death Valley's dark sky and will be utilizing appropriate lighting strategies.

Sky Quality, Conservation and Research

Astro volunteer Marni Berendsen completed an addendum to our 2015 report in November 2016. That report is attached. No additional SQM measurements were taken since last fall; our goal is to take measurements again in November 2017.

Grants

In 2017, Death Valley hosted an Astro Volunteer from the National Park Service Dark Sky Program. This amateur astronomer has returned year after year to train rangers both in how to use telescopes and in how to provide interpretive programming related to the night sky.

Outreach

The park features a night sky calendar in the park newspaper.

Park staff presented 52 night sky programs and two major events that included telescope viewing. Approximately 3,000 people participated in these programs.

Community and Media Relations

Death Valley's neighbor at Furnace Creek is the Oasis at Death Valley, a resort owned by Xanterra. The property is undergoing extensive renovation at this time. Park Managers have requested that they plan any changes in lighting with the dark sky in mind. Local staff have agreed that this is important, but it's unclear how much control they have over the situation. Xanterra promotes their hotels in Death Valley using the International Dark Sky designation, so it's likely they will complete the project with this goal in mind.
